




Giving Consent for Screening Programmes





This is an Easy to Read information leaflet.

Screening – your choice



It is your choice to take part in our screening programmes or not.

When you say yes, you give consent.

When you say no, you refuse consent.



You can say yes or no.

You should get the supports you need to make your decision.




You have to give your own consent before you can have a screening test.

Usually, no-one else can give consent for you.



You can give or refuse consent in different ways, for example, by speaking, nodding your head, writing or using a communication device.

Screening – your choice



Our information will support you to understand what screening is.

You can ask questions before or at your appointment too.



You can read our information leaflet about the screening programme.



There are photo stories to explain what happens during a screening test.



You can read our leaflet about the benefits and harms of screening.

This will tell you the good and bad parts to screening.

Screening – your choice



You can read our leaflet about how we look after your information.

This leaflet tells you how we collect, keep, and use your information.



It might help to talk about the screening programme with your family and friends.

You could look at the information together.



It might help to talk to someone that has had the screening test before.



You will be asked for consent every time you have a screening test.


What am I giving consent for?



When you give consent, you agree to take part in a screening programme and to have a screening test.



We will collect and keep your personal information, including your name, address, date of birth, and doctor details.



We will keep information about your screening test and your results, for example, photos from an eye test or mammogram.



We will ask for consent if we want to use your information for research.

No consent



You can say no to taking part in a screening programme.

This means you do not give consent.



You can change your mind about having a screening test at any time.



You can tell the person doing the screening test to stop anytime you want.



There must be a way for you to communicate if you change your mind and cannot use words. For example, put up your hand to say stop.


No consent



If you do not want to take part in a screening programme, phone us and tell us.



You can email us if you prefer.



We will not contact you again.



If you change your mind at a later date, you can call us again.

We can put you back on the list.
